# **DSAG: Danehill Speedwatch Action Group**

At a public meeting in the parish, a couple of years ago, speeding on our roads was raised as a major concern. Local police are overloaded, as we all know.

Danehill Speedwatch Action Group was formed as a way to help the police combat this issue. The police then trained a couple of our volunteers who in turn trained others.

We are an independent group formed by local volunteers. We are equipped with a calibrated radar speed measuring device, some hi-vis jackets and a clipboard. We are helping the police improve road safety.



Our mission is to educate drivers into obeying the speed limits – exceeding them by just a small amount can be the difference between a minor injury and death, in the event of an accident.

We measure the speeds of passing vehicles in several locations in the parish. Drivers exceeding the limit have their data input to the Police Community Speedwatch website. This information stays with the individual drivers record so that multiple transgressions can easily be identified. The police will then follow up with a warning letter or a visit. The database covers Kent, Sussex and Surrey.

The A275 is a particularly frequent location for people exceeding the 30mph – we regularly clock drivers doing over 50mph on this road.

Occasionally we receive abuse from drivers – this is also logged on the database, as are people using their phones while driving.

We still find it amazing how many drivers are exceeding the speed limit in the parish and, clearly, not by just a little. You can help us make the parish safer by observing the speed limits at all times and never getting on the police database.

## Danehill and Chelwood Gate Jubilee Celebrations

The Danehill and Chelwood Gate Platinum Jubilee Celebrations were held over 4 wonderful days in June, starting with a Children's Party organised by the Danehill C of E School PTA. The event attracted over 100 children from not only this parish but from surrounding areas. The weather was glorious which meant that while the younger children were entertained by the engaging Al Start in the fabulous marquee (funded by the PC), many others were able to play on the Recreation Grounds which were in perfect condition. There were football games galore, cartwheels spinning, and lots of ice cream consumed!

Many families stayed for the 'Party in the Park', taking part in the Barn Dance led by Square the Circle Ceilidh band, generously funded by the DHMH. Even though new to many, children and adults got involved with a fun dance. The newly upgraded Pavilion provided a most suitable home for The Club@danehill bar, which had queues out of the door for most of the afternoon and evening as a substantial crowd gathered, and they were nearly drunk dry! The Mick Wells BBQ was a big hit and, along with Twisted Toppings Pizza van, quickly sold out. Bill Walters very kindly provided some excellent background singing whilst villagers enjoyed catching up after the last few years of no contact.

Children and adults enjoyed the disco whilst waiting for 9.45pm – the time beacons were lit nationally to mark the Jubilee. # **PC Role in Planning Applications**

The Parish Council (PC) are a formal consultee to all planning applications submitted to either Wealden District Council (WDC) or East Sussex County Council (ESCC). Applications for planning approval are a statutory requirement for most forms of development ranging from new houses and extensions to major public sector projects such as for highways, education, minerals and waste. The statutory regulations governing the planning approval process are extensive and in some areas quite complex. Balancing demand for new or improved developments is frequently controversial with the necessity to consider the need against such matters as environment, conservation, architecture place setting, public opinion etc. Over the years government have introduced legislation to allow certain relatively minor works to be permitted without the need for planning approval such as small rear domestic extensions and garden sheds. However

Danehill and Chelwood Gate is located within a designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and as such some of these "permitted developments" do not apply, so it is always necessary to check with WDC. Additionally parts of Danehill have been designated a Conservation Area and all planning applications within this area will need to meet specific criteria where professional expertise and dialogue with WDC is normally required. The consultation process with the PC is very limited, as it provides a means to gauge the views of the local community with the ability of simply seeking a response to SUPPORT or OBJECT to the proposed works, although it does provide a means of providing some commentary on local opinion. The Wealden MvAlerts mvalerts@ wealden.gov.uk allows individuals to see a list of planning applications for properties located within a specified distance of their home/business.

# **Climate Change**



The committee have been focusing on making life easier for our local wildlife with a few changes this summer. We have recommended that the roadside grass verges are only cut in the villages and 'where line of sight' by the road is affected by long grass, hoping to encourage invertebrates to thrive. In the same vein we have asked that no herbicides or pesticides are routinely used and only where an alternative cannot be found or safety is compromised - such as on the tennis court where persistent moss causes slipping problems. Wildflower seeds have been planted on the small strip of ground between the playground and the path to Danehill giving us a pretty alternative to the scrubby grass previously there and the bees a tasty treat. We also attend each of the village markets and try to bring a variety of experts on wildlife/insulation/ recycling and green issues as well as the regular plant swap. If you have any suggestions for us please come and see us or contact us via the Parish Council.

## We plant two Jubilee trees



The Queen's Green Canopy is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. Your Parish joined in with this nationwide project by planting two different and distinctive trees to commemorate the occasion.

On 11th March 2022, the 70th day of this Jubilee year, our former Parish Chairman, Rhodri Lewis, wielded his spade and planted a British Oak sapling on Jubilee Green. Though it will take over fifty years to reach 60 feet high, it should mature into a wonderful tree that could still be there in 500 years. The Parish Council also thought that it would a lovely idea to have another Jubilee Tree that was more accessible to all the community.

So, we reached agreement with the Red Lion, to reinstate a tree in front of the pub, by planting a smaller, ornamental Jubilee Tree in the garden area along the A275. To help



us with this job, we called on Beaconsfield Road resident Mrs Violet Rivers to do the honours. Vi....as we all know her was born at the Red Lion in December 1925 and has lived in the village all her life.

So, it seemed, just right, to ask her to officially plant our second Jubilee tree.

The Prince of Wales has said on many occasions that "planting a tree is a statement of hope and faith in the future" and we hope that both our trees will delight parishioners for years to come.

# **Ashdown Forest Parking Update**

The Conservators are at present trying to work out the final details of the payment scheme and how this will be implemented with their chosen parking company. They anticipate the scheme will launch later in the summer, most likely in the autumn. We understand that these charges will apply to all car parks owned by the Conservators. According to the information we have the charges will be:-

Up to 1 Hour £2.00

Up to 2 Hours £2.50

Up to 4 Hours £4.00

All day £5.00

Annual pass £80.00

Six month Winter pass £50.00

Annual and Winter passes will cover 2 cars in a household.

In addition, they are hosting the launch of the High Weald Walking Festival at the Forest Centre on Saturday September 10th. For more information about the walking festival visit:

## **Parish News**

#### Playground





The Parish Council has been reviewing playground needs and safety for some time. Whilst there was need to replace the surfacing, much of the equipment was in good condition and decent quality. With a modest budget and a search for value for money we agreed a scheme to replace the surfacing and a few added items.

We hope the families of the parish will enjoy the new facilities in the playground. The tired old surfacing has been replaced by a new safety surface and should lower maintenance needs in the future. Two added items of equipment, a huge basket swing and a jeep are now available to update the fun on offer and the seesaw was kept after consultation with local parents. Overall, the investment has been just over 40k but should make a significant difference and give a bit more adventure to all ages using the playground.

The Parish Council will continue to review maintenance to keep the playground in good condition and will look at further up-grades when grant funding allows.

## **Burial ground**

The mapping is almost complete and the new map and noticeboard will be arranged shortly. The old burial ground records make precise mapping



impossible but a list of all those buried will be accessible from the software which will be on the website by early autumn if not before.

#### Memorial Wall

Unfortunately, as we go to press, the wall is unfinished, and this is down to many factors beyond our control. The main and most crucial a lack of qualified craftsmen. After having the first attempt of construction taken down because of incorrect materials. contractor has found it nearly impossible to find a stone mason that is willing and has the time to take this job on. They have recently found one craftsman who has said that he would build it when he has time, and that's where we are.

The Parish Council is not the direct employer, this is through the Insurance Company of which there are many involved with this double traffic incident, and so we are as frustrated as many of our Parishioners.

The Contractor was instructed to tidy up the roadway & remove unnecessary materials from site. This has been done. So hopefully we will soon see the end of this saga.

# A Circular Walk Danehill Church to Horsted Keynes




- Start and End at Danehill Church (but you can join anywhere, of course)
- Length = 7.5 kilometres (4.7 miles)
- A few stiles and some mud after rain and during the winter.
- Short stretches of road walking and one moderately steep climb at step 12.
- Safety First although there are only a few of stretches of road walking where no footway or safe verge exists, please remember (as the Highway Code) to walk facing the on-coming traffic (e.g., on the right), the better to see any danger, unless you are on a blind bend.
- Where the paths cross farmland, please keep dogs on leads.
- Note that Autumn Lady's-tresses orchids flower in the churchyard (Aug-Sep) between road and church. Please do not to walk on or pick this rare orchid.

#### The Walk

- From the church, walk downhill along Church Lane into the war memorial green. Cross over Freshfield Lane, go past the Club then turn L descending down Horsted Lane.
- 2. Before Horsted Lane bends L soon after leaving the 30mph zone, there is a footpath on the R. Go over the stile and into the field. Follow the path crossing the field NW and down. At the bottom cross the track and enter the woods ahead.
- 3. Follow the path through the woods over a footbridge, past the end of the lake, turning R soon after onto a track alongside the lake.
- 4. Where the track crosses another path turn L uphill past a bench then through a short stretch of trees and out onto the corner of a field.

- 5. Follow the path uphill with the hedge on your R and into a narrow strip of trees that leads out onto Birchgrove Road
- 6. Turn R downhill. In about 200m turn L at the gate to the Horsted Keynes Service reservoir. Go around the gate and up the track, bearing R before the mesh gates along the footpath.
- 7. Emerging into a field, keep to the L until you come to a kissing gate on the L. Go through the gate and follow the path across three fields though three more kissing gates.
- 8. Pass the allotments onto a drive which leads out to the centre of Horsted Keynes beside the village shop.
- 9. Cross over the road and around The Crown pub onto the cricket pitch. Cross diagonally R to an opening in the hedge and turn L down Chapel Lane passing tennis courts on your R.
- 10. At the end go straight on into Wyatts Lane until you come to a sharp R with a bungalow ahead of you. There is a footpath passing down the side of the bungalow (don't worry if you miss it, just follow the drive downhill). Follow the footpath along the side of a field down a path and across a private drive where you emerge onto the lane again.
- 11. Follow the lane downhill where it turns into a track and then into the woods. Follow this to the very bottom (can be very muddy at times). Do not take any RH paths.
- 12. Head uphill on the edge of the field following the track and L through the trees. When you come to a drive, turn R uphill.
- 13. As the drive levels out, keep to the LH fence where the path leaves the drive by a hedge.
- 14. At the end is Freshfield Lane; turn R and within 35m L down a track towards Butchers Barn.
- 15. At the bottom of the hill the footpath veers off the track going L up over a stile. Follow the LH fence always bearing L wherever other paths join. Do not go into the woods.
- 16. Cross the dilapidated stile in the corner and carry on, keeping to the R of the fields and then past the RH side of a shed and house. Emerging onto a driveway, follow it to the R.
- 17. Upon reaching Church Lane turn L. The church and the start/end point are 5 minutes up the road.
